Alumni Highlight

Our alumni are important to us. If you are an alumni, we would love to know what you have been up to since graduating from Talmud Torah School.



I have nothing but fond memories of Talmud Torah, despite receiving the strap (in what seems to me) on average once a week during grades one and two. I am sure I deserved it, for I also recall being something of an unruly scamp in those early, rambunctious years. Nevertheless, Talmud Torah laid the foundation for my understanding and appreciation of Hebrew, Judaism in general, and in particular Israel and Zionism, during my formative years from kindergarten and grade one through junior high. I graduated grade six in 1959 when Israel was not yet a teenager but already a heroic and historical entity. In those days we used to exalt that in Israel if you threw a stone at someone, they would use it to start building a house.

My earliest memory is of the original school on 103rd Street, where I attended kindergarten. Then the “new” school opened in Glenora at 106th Avenue and 133rd Street opposite the old traffic circle on 107th Avenue and Groat Road. I went to Oliver Junior High for grades 7 and 8, and continued the afterschool program at TT for two years while also studying for my Bar Mitzvah with Mr. Yedlin and Mr. Chetner. For grade nine I was sent to yeshiva at the Hebrew Theological College in Skokie, Illinois, after which I returned to Edmonton to complete high school at Ross Sheppard, class of 1965. I then attended the University of Alberta, majoring in English with a minor in Philosophy, class of 1968.

In 1969, I attended the University of California, Los Angeles, in the MFA program for Motion Picture Direction & Production. I returned to Edmonton in 1970, where I eventually worked with Film West Associates Ltd, a local independent film production company, and also ran the Cinematheque 16 at the Edmonton Art Gallery for several years. I then worked for the City of Edmonton Parks & Recreation Department out of the Queen Elizabeth II Planetarium, writing, directing and producing audio/visual programs for a number of city departments. In 1982, I accepted a job in Victoria, working first for the Ministry of Social Services in a staff training capacity, then for Government Information Services for a number of years. In 1987-88, I moved to northern California and worked for twenty years as an audio/visual and multimedia producer at San Jose State University in the Academic Technology Department. In 2007, after my Dad passed away, I took early retirement and moved back to Edmonton to look after my elderly mom and quickly became involved with the Edmonton Jewish Film Festival, which continues to this day.

I remember most, but not all, of my TT teachers. They included Mrs. Gershon and Mr. Bar-El, Mrs. McLeod, Mrs. Yedlin, Mr. Yedlin, and Mr. Chetner, who was also the principal and ran Junior Congregation, where we learned to daven the Shabbat service. I think I also had a Mrs. Flint at some point, who made us sing “Santa Lucia” over and over again. My favorites were Mrs. McLeod and Mrs. Yedlin. Mrs. Yedlin in particular encouraged my interest and skill in Hebrew calligraphy by having me fill the chalkboards that ran along the upper edge of the classroom with Hebrew sayings in upper case lettering. I am sure it was her way of keeping me busy by channeling my youthful exuberance into something productive.

I also remember most of my classmates from elementary school at Talmud Torah. They include (on the male side) my cousin Sam Winter. I was Shmuel alef, he was Shmuel bet. Other members of my cohort were Mike Mishna, Ben Zalmanovich, Joe Shafir, Sid Shugarman, Irving Kusin, Nathan Feldman, Jack Lisker, Stan Wiseman, Jack Epstein, David Milner, Sid Antflick, Cliff Goldstein, Saul Markovich and Selig Sacks. On the female side, my cohort included Lynn Weinlos, Anita Satanove, Janet Rosen, Bonnie Koliger, Maxine Frolich, Beth Rudolph, Evelyn Eaman and Evelyn Hardin. I was also friends with certain students who were one year older as well as one year younger than I. In particular I recall Benny Landa, Wayne Shur, Jeff Dvorkin, Ralph Shapiro, Frank Phillet, Sheldon Schloss, Bruce Mintz, Milton Bogoch and Barry Slawsky. From the younger class I remember Mitch Wise, Earl Bogoch, Sid Estrin, Bobby Landa and Arnie Landa. I was very active in Young Judaea in those days, and went on to hold some local, regional and national offices, as well as conducting drama programs at senior YJ camps in Ontario and British Columbia through the 1960s.

Perhaps my most vivid memory of my Talmud Torah years is riding my 3-speed bicycle to school, both summer and winter, down Stony Plain Road from my home on 116th Street, and through Glenora and Capitol Hill after school to the Weinlos house to hang out with my lifelong friend, Lynn Weinlos, then riding home later down 102nd Avenue.

Think back...look ahead was one of my favourite student reflection strategies when I was in the classroom. This same strategy applies today as I prepare a message for you.

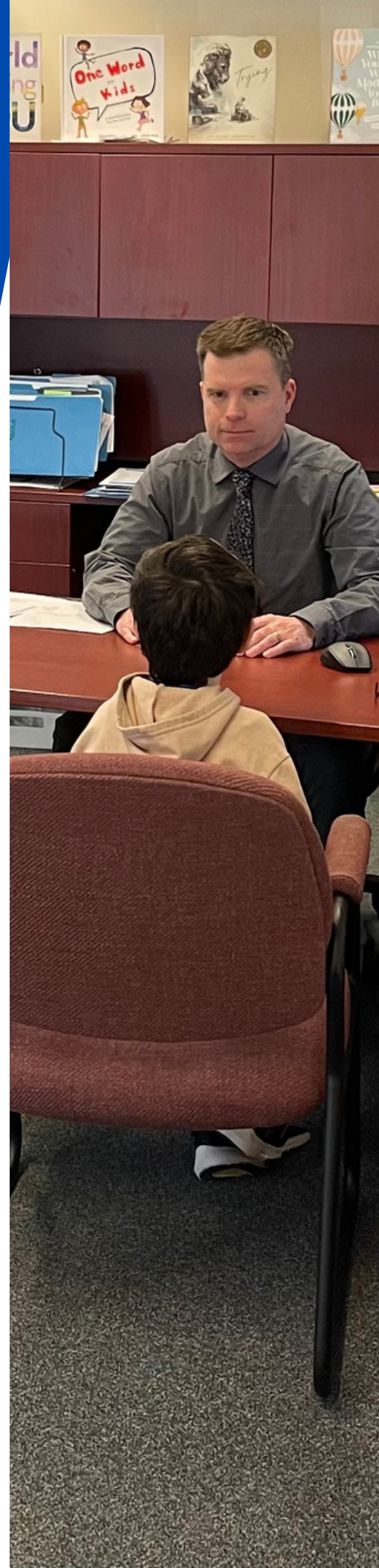

I am optimistic about the high rate of parents who have completed the pre-enrolment process. It is exciting to think about student learning experiences for 2023-2024. We are welcoming a new group of Kindergarten students. Parents joined us for an open house information session on March 30, and the turnout was terrific.

Once again, I would like to thank the staff for their ongoing commitment to students and families through communication, planning lessons, supporting students, and creating meaningful experiences. The Purim Carnival at TT; an experience no other Edmonton school can replicate.

After three long years of modified Purim events due to Covid, the celebration was back and better than ever! Each year, grade 6 students look forward in anticipation to the Purim Carnival, as they are given leadership roles in running the event. They brainstorm ideas for activities the whole school will enjoy, working together to execute their vision. Posters are prepared and hung on the school walls with enticing pictures and descriptions of the activities the students can look forward to.



The most anticipated activity our Grade 6 students look forward to working on is the Haunted House! You can hear and see the excitement during the lead up to Purim as students go in and out of the gym stage, up and down the school library stairs, working on bringing their ideas to life. If you speak to any TT alumni you can be sure the Purim Carnival is one of the significant memories. The lunchroom was extra noisy the day of the carnival, with kids chatting to their classmates about what activities they were going to first and how they couldn't wait to join in the fun! On your mark, get set, and they're off! I chose to follow one group of kids as they moved from station to station, and this group chose to go straight to the haunted house. As they waited in line for their turn to enter their energy was palpable! As the first group exited, you could hear comments, such as "that wasn't scary at all", to "something jumped out and touched me!"

"Where to, next?", one asked, and off they went to answer trivia questions in the kitchen. The colourful trivia wheel displayed numbers, and each number corresponded to different movie-themed questions, depending on whether a student was in Div. 1 (K-Gr. 3) or Div. 2 (Gr. 4-6). Round and round the wheel went as the first student stepped up to take a spin. Each student answered a question, and most received a prize for the correct answer. It was then off to the gymnasium for Purim Carnival Sports! The posters stated that you could participate in football, soccer, and hockey, and that's just what this group did! They particularly enjoyed Armchair QB with the football. I even gave it a try! After getting hot and sweaty from sports, it was off to get a snack in Room 19 to fuel themselves for the next activities. The group picked up bags of chips and drank from their water bottles to quench their thirst.



While waiting for the kids to finish their chips, I took a look around to observe the variety of costumes students were wearing, and it was amazing! Such a variety on display throughout the hallways and classrooms, from Disney characters, to super heroes, to John and Ringo from Sgt. Pepper's Lonely-Hearts Club Band! Of course, TT school staff were decked out too. Each year, school staff come up with a group theme, and this year's theme was FRUIT. There were 3 pineapples, 2 strawberries, 2 bunches of grapes, as well as a watermelon, blueberry, banana, lime and avocado. In addition, many of the TTELC educators dressed up to the delight of their students. Of course, our hallways were lined with Purim artwork galore. Papier mache masks created by Gr. 3 students hung outside their classroom, while adorable multi-media carnival-style creations of students wearing silly costumes were displayed outside the Grade 1 class. Gr. 2 created fun artwork through playing a game titled "Roll a Picasso Art Game for Purim".

They had fun creating funny faces and also learned about Pablo Picasso and Cubism. Fueled and ready, the group set off to the lunchroom for some arts and crafts, including face painting, colouring Purim masks, and hair styling! Fifteen or twenty minutes later they were painted, styled and ready for the Games Station in Room 9. Students had the chance to win prizes by throwing a ball and trying to hit paper cups from different distances, as well as attempting to get a small ball into large cups on a table. Then we were off on a treasure hunt!

Grade 6 students took turns running their assigned stations. It was a fun and challenging role for our student leaders. They brainstormed ahead of time, and made last minute preparations to be ready for the rush of students. Their energy and enthusiasm were contagious and they beamed with pride as they ran their stations with confidence. The younger students in the Early Learning Centre lined the hallways watching the costume parade as it snaked through the hallways and into the school office. Some parents of our younger K-6 students, as well as those in the ELC, joined in on the fun and could be seen taking pictures of their children joyfully participating in the Purim festivities.



By the time 3:00 pm rolled around, my group had finished participating in all of the stations and was ready to pack it in. I hope you enjoyed a glimpse into the life of a TT Purim Carnival student and that you almost felt like you were there!

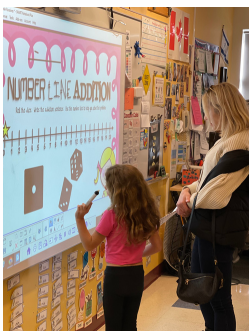
Division 2 Field Trips

We learned about the first female mayor, Janice Rhea Reimer. When asked if she would go to City Hall again, Noa Eliyahu, a grade 6 student said, "I think everyone should get a chance to go because it is a good learning experience". Some walls in City Hall were made of limestone that are approximately 42 million years old. We saw multiple fossils on the visible part of the limestone, which was very interesting to see because it shows some of Alberta's geologic history.

On the 27th of March the grade 6 class went to the Alberta Legislature. We went on a fantastic tour and we learned about all 3 of the readings done in the legislature. At the end of the tour we met and took pictures with MLA (member of the legislative assembly) Mr. Lorne Dach. We saw an interesting 12 minute film on the history of Alberta. Overall it was a very fun trip!

On the 16th of March the grade 4 class walked the 15 minutes to Centennial School and, with the grade 4 class at Centennial, made carnival rides from popsicle sticks, egg cartons and other materials. They had an amazing engineering experience learning, working, and testing the rides they had made. They worked really hard and I think the rides turned out great! "Two grade 4 classes, 3 hours, one amazing build experience," said Ms. Kovacs, the teacher who went on the field trip with the class.

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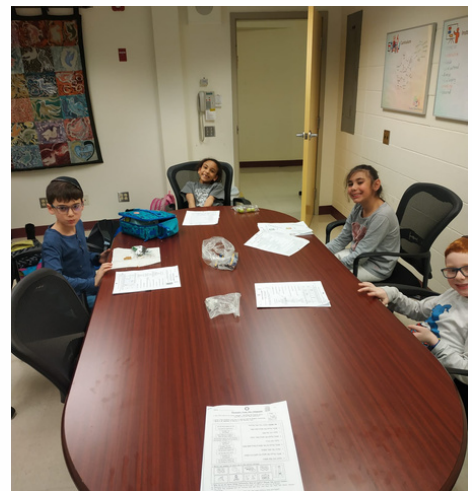
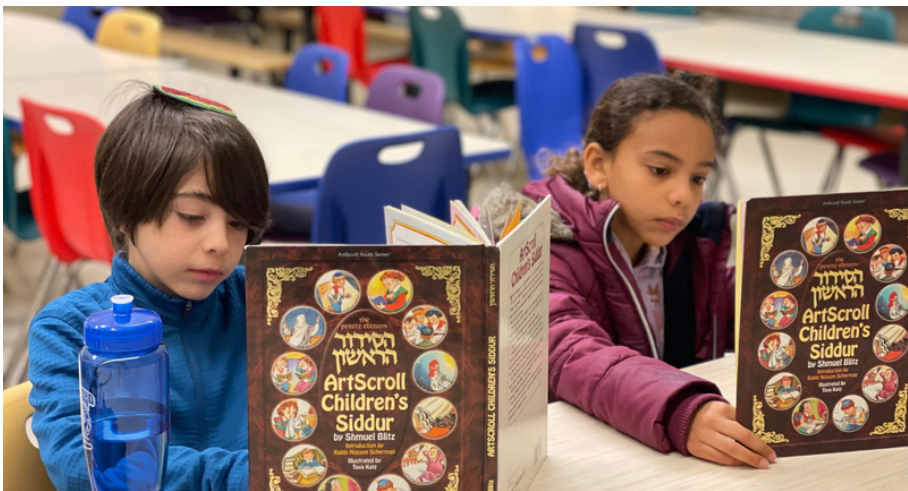
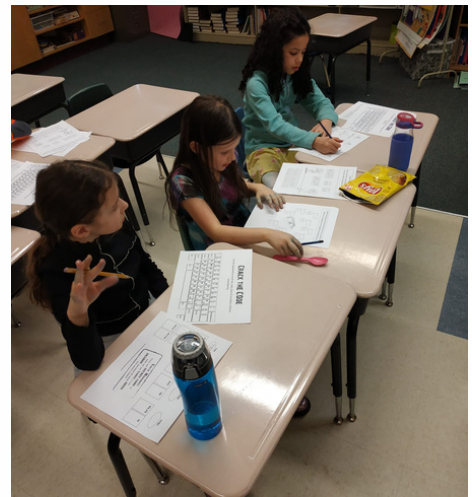
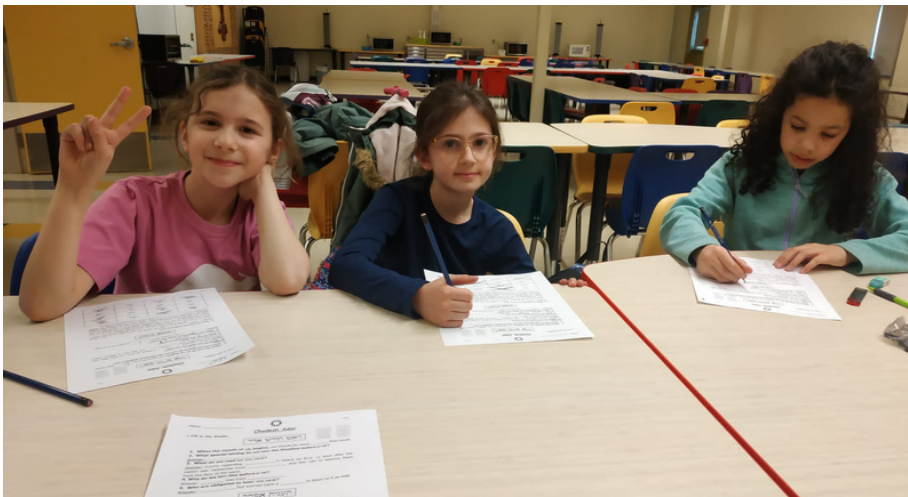
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AJP@TT (Ancillary Judaic Program)
